Action Requested

Staff requests approval of the Sandy Ballot Title, Question, Summary & Explanatory Statement materials, and Resolution 25-02 Sandy Fire District Annexation into Clackamas Fire District.

Background

The attached draft ballot materials and Resolution 25-02 outline a proposed measure for the November 2025 election that would annex Sandy Fire District into Clackamas Fire District. Clackamas Fire has been providing full fire and emergency medical services to Sandy since July 2023 under a service contract that expires in June 2030.

This annexation measure would formalize that partnership by establishing permanent district-level fire and EMS services for Sandy residents. If approved, it would:

- Ensure permanent, district-level fire and EMS services for residents, replacing the temporary contract.
- Allow Sandy residents to vote in Clackamas Fire District elections and serve on the district's board.
- Support continued 24/7 staffing at the Sandy and Dover stations and protect recent investments in equipment and personnel, particularly for wildfire response, rural coverage, and EMS.
- Transition funding to Clackamas Fire's permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The estimated monthly cost for the median assessed home is approximately \$4.68.
- Exclude Sandy residents from paying Clackamas Fire's existing enhanced levy unless renewed in the future, at which time they would be eligible to vote on it.

A proposed ballot title, question, summary, and explanatory statement are included in the Board Packet for your consideration. **Formal Sandy Fire Board approval is required to refer the measure to the November 2025 ballot.**

Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of ballot materials and Resolution 25-02 Sandy Fire District Annexation into Clackamas Fire District.

Sandy Annexation Measure
Title, Question, Summary and Explanatory Statement

Ballot Title (10-word limit)

Annexes Sandy Fire District into Clackamas Fire District

Ballot Question (20-word limit)

Shall Sandy Fire District be annexed into Clackamas Fire District for fire protection and emergency medical services?

Ballot Summary (175-word limit)

This measure annexes Sandy Fire District into Clackamas Fire District, which currently provides fire and emergency medical services to Sandy-area residents under a contract expiring in June 2030.

Annexation will ensure permanent, district-level fire and EMS services for residents, replacing the temporary contract. It will give residents the ability to vote in fire district elections, serve on the district's board of directors, and help shape decisions about service levels and funding.

Clackamas Fire serves more than 265,000 residents in communities including Boring, Happy Valley, Damascus, and Oregon City—all of which voted to permanently join the district within the past 20 years.

If approved, property owners will pay the district's permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. For the median assessed property in Sandy Fire District, the cost impact is estimated to be \$4.68 per month.

Annexation will protect critical investments in staffing and equipment for wildfire response, enhanced rural protection, and emergency medical services.

Explanatory Statement (500-word limit)

Since July 2023, Clackamas Fire has been providing full emergency fire and medical services to Sandy under a service contract. Thanks to this partnership, residents have received improved emergency services, with Clackamas Fire staffing a three-person engine company 24/7 and a two-person rescue unit for 12 hours a day, seven days a week at Sandy's main station.

The Sandy Fire District is referring this measure to voters to consider formal annexation into Clackamas Fire District. Annexation would ensure long-term emergency response stability, expand local representation by allowing Sandy voters to elect district board members, and

provide access to the same service levels enjoyed by other communities in the district, including Boring, Happy Valley, Damascus, and Oregon City. Clackamas Fire District has an Insurance Services Office (ISO) Class 2 rating, which is higher than Sandy's. Annexation into Clackamas Fire may help some property owners secure more affordable insurance coverage.

If approved, property owners would pay taxes directly to Clackamas Fire for fire and EMS services. Property owners would pay the district's permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The cost difference between the Clackamas Fire rate and what residents currently pay for emergency services is estimated to be \$0.22 per \$1,000 of assessed value, or approximately \$4.68 per month for the median assessed home.

In 2022, Clackamas Fire voters approved an enhanced funding levy for emergency response. If annexation is approved, Sandy-area residents would not pay this levy and would have the opportunity to vote on any future funding measures, such as a levy renewal.

Annexation would provide a predictable funding structure, maintain professional firefighter staffing, and enhance regional coordination. Clackamas Fire would continue to operate out of the Sandy and Dover Fire Stations. The main station in Sandy has been fully staffed with Clackamas Fire personnel since 2023, and since that time there has been a significant increase in volunteer staffing at the Dover Station. Annexation would support maintaining these enhanced staffing levels over the long-term.

A "yes" vote supports annexation into Clackamas Fire District. In spring 2025, Sandy and Clackamas Fire Districts hosted a joint public meeting and two community open houses, conducted a survey, and recorded a webinar that is available at www.ClackamasFire.com/clackamas-annexations.

Based on community feedback, the Sandy Fire District determined there is strong public interest in securing long-term, stable fire and EMS services by joining Clackamas Fire.

A "no" vote would maintain the current temporary contract with Clackamas Fire District. Should Sandy residents decide not to join Clackamas Fire, options are limited. Clackamas Fire would likely require an updated contract to cover the true cost of enhanced service level standards, including wildfire prevention, emergency response and deployment of light vehicles. This would likely mean additional taxes or cuts to fire and emergency medical services for Sandy residents, one reason both elected district boards support annexation.

RESOLUTION #25-02

A RESOLUTION OF THE SANDY FIRE DISTRICT, OREGON, PROPOSING ANNEXATION OF THE DISTRICT INTO CLACKAMAS FIRE DISTRICT #1 EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026, CONTINGENT UPON VOTER APPROVAL, AND AFFIRMING A PLAN WHEREBY DISTRICT PROPERTY OWNERS WILL PAY ONLY THE DISTRICT'S PERMANENT RATE.

WHEREAS, the Sandy Fire District (“District”) has a long-standing history of providing fire protection and emergency medical services to its residents, evolving over the decades from a volunteer-based model to a professionally staffed organization committed to public safety; and

WHEREAS, recognizing the growing complexity and demands of emergency response services, the District has actively explored partnerships to ensure long-term sustainability, high service quality, and financial responsibility; and

WHEREAS, Clackamas Fire District #1 (“Clackamas Fire”) is a well-established regional provider of fire and emergency medical services, with the infrastructure, staffing, and operational resources necessary to meet the evolving needs of growing communities; and

WHEREAS, Sandy Fire District and Clackamas Fire have developed a collaborative relationship centered on shared values of professionalism, responsiveness, and service excellence; and

WHEREAS, the District has studied its long-term service delivery options and has determined that annexation into Clackamas Fire would provide enhanced service levels, operational efficiency, and broader regional integration; and

WHEREAS, annexation would allow Sandy Fire District residents to receive services equivalent to those offered to other Clackamas Fire residents, participate in District governance by electing representatives to the Clackamas Fire Board of Directors, and support a financially stable fire and emergency medical services system; and

WHEREAS, the District has engaged in public outreach, information sharing, and community engagement efforts to ensure residents are fully informed and have had the opportunity to ask questions and provide input regarding annexation; and

WHEREAS, the District intends to refer to voters a ballot measure in November 2025 seeking approval of annexation into Clackamas Fire District #1, with the annexation becoming effective July 1, 2026, if approved; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to ORS 198.900, the District proposes a debt distribution plan under which property owners within Sandy Fire District would, upon annexation, be subject only to Clackamas Fire’s permanent tax rate of \$2.40 per \$1,000 of assessed value, and not any existing general obligation debt of Clackamas Fire at the time of annexation; and



WHEREAS, the Clackamas Fire District Board of Directors must agree to the annexation proposal and the accompanying debt distribution plan prior to the matter being placed before Sandy Fire District voters.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SANDY FIRE DISTRICT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The Sandy Fire District expresses its appreciation for the cooperative relationship with Clackamas Fire District #1 and looks forward to continuing and deepening that relationship through full integration via annexation.

Section 2. Pursuant to ORS 198.866, the Board of Directors of the Sandy Fire District hereby formally proposes annexation of the District into Clackamas Fire District #1, contingent upon voter approval at the November 2025 election.

Section 3. The District requests that the Clackamas Fire District Board of Directors approve this annexation proposal and agree to a debt distribution plan pursuant to ORS 198.900. Under this plan, upon annexation, property owners within the Sandy Fire District shall be subject only to Clackamas Fire's permanent tax rate and not to any general obligation indebtedness existing prior to annexation. This plan does not preclude future District-wide taxes, such as local option levies or bonds, approved by all eligible voters, including those residing in the Sandy Fire District area after annexation.

Section 4. If the annexation measure is approved by voters, annexation shall become effective on July 1, 2026.

Section 5. In accordance with ORS 198.866, the District Secretary is directed to certify a copy of this resolution to the Clackamas Fire District #1 Board of Directors.

Section 6. This resolution shall become effective immediately upon its adoption.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT

JUNE 2025



Highlights

Clackamas Fire Crew 30 deployed to Canada and Alaska to support wildfire suppression efforts alongside other regional and national fire crews. These out-of-state deployments provide critical support to areas in need.

Clackamas Fire deployed personnel to the Rowena Fire in the Gorge and the Alder Springs Fire in Central Oregon.

Health & Safety held the first of two training classes for 15 new peer supporters.

Public Educator Trish Noble developed and implemented a preschool fire safety program.

The Facilities team focused on completing the Station 12 remodel for staffing on July 1st in the Logan Community.

Training

Clackamas Fire sent 12 firefighters to Texas A&M University for training as Structural Collapse Specialists. The 80-hour curriculum covers the fundamental skills and knowledge required to respond safely and effectively to structural collapse incidents resulting from natural or human-caused disasters. In early 2026, we will be sending another 12 firefighters to the same course.

This class for all 24 firefighters was funded through FEMA Federal Emergency Management Agency's Assistance to Firefighters Grants Program.

Notable Events/Calls


- 6/18 – Residential Fire in Oregon City – South Battalion's D Shift responded to a reported tree fire. The response was upgraded to a task force as the fire spread to a manufactured home. The fire was quickly brought under control.
- 6/21 – Residential Fire in Sandy – East Battalion's D Shift arrived to a heavily-involved manufactured home fire. After the incident size-up, crews initiated exterior fire attack. Crews did a great job of establishing a water supply and opening up the structure with saws to control the fire.
- 6/29 – Ammonia Leak – Hazmat – North Battalion's D Shift responded to the report of an ammonia leak. Upon arrival, they confirmed an ammonia leak with the digital monitoring system. Gresham Fire's hazmat team responded and partnered in the operation. Crews conducted a Level A entry during which they controlled the leak and safely ventilated the space.






