Action Requested

Staff requests approval of the Sandy Ballot Title, Question, Summary & Explanatory Statement materials, for Sandy Fire District's Annexation into Clackamas Fire District.

Background

The attached draft ballot materials for the proposed measure in the May 2026 election that would annex Sandy Fire District into Clackamas Fire District. Clackamas Fire has been providing full fire and emergency medical services to Sandy since July 2023 under a service contract that expires in June 2030.

This annexation measure would formalize that partnership by establishing permanent district-level fire and EMS services for Sandy residents. If approved, it would:

- Ensure permanent, district-level fire and EMS services for residents, replacing the temporary contract.
- Allow Sandy residents to vote in Clackamas Fire District elections and serve on the district's board.
- Support continued 24/7 staffing at the Sandy main station and volunteer staffing at the Dover station and protect recent investments in equipment and personnel, particularly for wildfire response, rural coverage, and EMS.
- Transition funding to Clackamas Fire's permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The estimated monthly cost for the median assessed home is approximately \$4.68.
- Exclude Sandy residents from paying Clackamas Fire's existing enhanced levy unless renewed in the future, at which time they would be eligible to vote on it.

A proposed ballot title, question, summary, and explanatory statement are included in the Board Packet for your consideration. **Formal Sandy Fire Board approval is required to refer the measure to the May 2026 ballot.**

Recommendation

Staff recommends approval of ballot materials for Sandy Fire District Annexation into Clackamas Fire District.

Sandy Annexation Measure *(Revised 2.9.26)*
Title, Question, Summary, and Explanatory Statement

Ballot Title (10-word limit)

Annexes Sandy Fire District into Clackamas Fire District

Ballot Question (20-word limit)

Shall Sandy Fire District dissolve and be annexed into Clackamas Fire District for fire protection and emergency medical services?

Ballot Summary (175-word limit)

The Sandy Fire Board is seeking voter approval to dissolve and annex into Clackamas Fire District, which currently provides all fire and emergency medical services to Sandy-area residents under a contract expiring in June 2030.

Clackamas Fire began providing services to Sandy in 2021, resulting in expanded staffing and equipment at the Sandy and Eagle Creek stations. Annexation will maintain firefighters at these stations and establish permanent, district-level fire and EMS services for residents, replacing a temporary contract. It will expand rescue coverage from 12 to 24 hours/day and give residents the right to vote in elections for the District’s Board of Directors and funding measures, such as bonds or levies.

Clackamas Fire serves more than 265,000 residents in communities including Boring, Eagle Creek, and Damascus—all of which voted to permanently join the district.

If approved, property owners will pay the district’s permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. For the median property in Sandy Fire District assessed at \$255,772, the cost impact is estimated to be \$4.68 per month.

Explanatory Statement (500-word limit)

Since 2021, Clackamas Fire has been providing emergency fire and medical services to Sandy under a service contract. Thanks to this partnership, residents have received improved emergency services, with Clackamas Fire staffing a three-person engine company 24/7 and a new two-person rescue unit for 12 hours a day, seven days a week at Sandy’s main station.

The Sandy Fire District is referring this measure to voters to consider formal annexation into Clackamas Fire District. Annexation would ensure long-term emergency response stability, expand local representation by allowing Sandy voters to elect district board members, and

provide access to the same service levels enjoyed by other communities in the district, including Boring, Happy Valley, Damascus, and Oregon City. Clackamas Fire District has an Insurance Services Office (ISO) Class 2 rating, which is higher than Sandy's. Annexation into Clackamas Fire may help some property owners secure more affordable insurance coverage.

If approved, property owners would pay taxes directly to Clackamas Fire for fire and EMS services. Property owners would pay the district's permanent tax rate of \$2.4012 per \$1,000 of assessed value. The cost difference between the Clackamas Fire rate and what residents currently pay for emergency services is estimated to be \$0.22 per \$1,000 of assessed value, or approximately \$4.68 per month for the median home assessed at \$255,772. Half of homeowners will pay less than this amount.

In 2023, Clackamas Fire voters approved an enhanced funding levy, at a rate of \$0.52/1000, for emergency response. If annexation is approved, Sandy-area residents would not pay this levy and would have the opportunity to vote on any future funding measures, such as a levy renewal.

Annexation provides a more predictable funding structure instead of a temporary contract. It will make permanent the improvements Clackamas Fire has made. A "yes" vote will maintain existing firefighters in the Sandy community on a permanent basis, expand coverage on the new rescue from 12 to 24 hours per day and increase staffing at Sandy's main fire station. It will also keep both the Sandy and Firwood Stations open, protect enhanced staffing at nearby Eagle Creek, and preserve and strengthen the volunteer and Explorer programs.

A "yes" vote supports annexation into Clackamas Fire District, effective July 1, 2026.

A "no" vote would maintain the temporary contract with Clackamas Fire District, which is not sustainable beyond 2030. Should Sandy residents decide not to join Clackamas Fire, options are limited. Clackamas Fire would likely require an updated contract to cover the true cost of enhanced service level standards, including wildfire prevention, emergency response and deployment of light vehicles. This would likely mean additional taxes or cuts to fire and emergency medical services for Sandy residents, one reason both elected district boards support annexation.

Crews were dispatched to Kaiser Sunnyside Hospital on reports of an unknown white powder found in the hospital. The Hazmat team responded and coordinated with the Clackamas County Sheriff's Office, as the substance was part of an ongoing criminal investigation.

1/29 Residential Fire in Milwaukie
At 9:12am, crews responded to a residential fire following reports of a fire in the laundry room. Upon arrival, firefighters found smoke coming from the eaves and a downstairs window. Crews knocked down the fire within 11 minutes of dispatch. No injuries were reported and the cause of the fire is still under investigation.

1/29 Commercial Fire in Milwaukie
At 9:04pm, crews responded to a commercial fire at the Willamette Valley Manor. The fire originated inside a kitchen wall and activated the building's sprinkler system. Due to the building's construction, only horizontal ventilation was used. Firefighters quickly gained access and extinguished the fire. No injuries were reported.







Today at approximately 2:51 PM, Clackamas Fire responded to a diesel tanker carrying approximately 2,000 gallons of fuel that had overturned onto its driver's side on SE Revenue Rd. in Boring. The driver self-extricated from the vehicle and was uninjured.

Clackamas Fire's HazMat Team and Engine 314 arrived on scene and initially worked to plug the fuel leak. Due to the volume of diesel being released, crews transitioned to deploying a portable containment pool to capture as much fuel as possible and limit environmental impacts.

Firefighters stood by with a charged hoseline as a precaution in the event of ignition. Loop Hi-Way Towing utilized two tow trucks to safely return the vehicle to an upright position. Approximately 400 gallons of diesel fuel were released. Once the vehicle was upright, HazMat teams from Clackamas Fire and Gresham Fire conducted cleanup operations using absorbent materials. River City Environmental was notified and responded for additional mitigation. No injuries were reported.

Responding units included BC301, C313, C317, CRO301, E314, HM307, @greshamfiredept HM3, @clackasherriff, @clackamascounty, and @loophiwaytowing.





At approximately 2:34 a.m. this morning, Clackamas Fire responded to a residential fire on S Drefshill St. in Milwaukie. Initial reports indicated a fire involving the back porch of a single-family home.

Upon arrival, crews found fire extending from the back porch into the attic and interior of the residence. Firefighters initiated fire attack while also working to protect nearby homes and structures. Driven by high winds, the fire spread quickly through the house and to an outbuilding and nearby fence, but firefighters prevented it from reaching the neighboring home.

The two occupants of the residence safely evacuated prior to the arrival of first responders. No injuries were reported. The home sustained significant damage, and both occupants are displaced. The American Red Cross is assisting them with immediate needs.
